Family Affordability Fund

- SD83 received approximately 771K from the Provincial Government
- The fund was to target; food insecurity, school supplies, fees(cultural, extra-curricular, co-curricular), clothing/footwear
- PVP, Counsellors, Indigenous Education Council, PAC's were surveyed regarding the “needs” associated with their schools




2022 Student Responses (SLS)

How Will the Family Affordability Fund Be Allocated?

- All schools will have funds allocated to them on a per head count and needs base (vulnerability)
- A 5% contingency will be held back until spring
- Each school has received \$10K to date with the remainder of the fund being allocated by the end of November
- The dollars must be spent by June 30, 2023

Indigenous Grad Requirement

- Involves secondary students completing 4 credits of Indigenous-focused coursework to graduate.
- Will come into effect for the 2023/24 school year. Students graduating in 2023/24 will need to complete 4 credits of eligible courses to graduate.
- Provides opportunity for students to develop deeper understandings of the cultures, histories, contemporary contexts and perspectives of Indigenous peoples of BC.
- Help students to understand and promote diversity, equity, and inclusion in our schools and communities.



How Students Can Meet the Requirement

Successful Completion of 4 Credits from:



One or more of a variety of provincially-developed courses – **AND/OR**



A First Nations Language course at the 10-12 level – **AND/OR**



A locally-developed, Indigenous focused course (BAA) that meets specific criteria

Provincial Course Options:

- Explore the diversity of Indigenous peoples (First Nations, Métis and Inuit), cultures, histories, contemporary contexts and worldviews with a primary focus within B.C.
- Equivalent to English Language Arts and Social Studies curricula in terms of competency development and meeting post-secondary admission requirements
- Equal rigor to English Language Arts and Social Studies
- Director of Instruction – Indigenous Education (Chelsea Prince) is currently working with schools in preparation for the next school year.

District Student Advisory Council

Purpose: To provide senior staff and the Board of Education with youth input and perspective on topics that pertain to SD83 Schools.

- An Application for students to be part of the District Student Advisory Council (DSAC) has been developed
- The first meeting will take place in December/January
- The DSAC members will be actively involved in the Strategic Planning Process
- Schools with Middle and/or Secondary Students will have representation on the council
